OHIO'S RICH NATURAL GAS AND CRUDE OIL
RESERVES PROVIDE MANY OPPORTUNITIES TO HELP
THE STATE'S ECONOMY GROW AND PROSPER.

Did you know?

According to the Ohio Department of Jobs and Family Services "Ohio Shale – Quarterly Economic Trends for Ohio Oil and Gas Industries" report:



- 178,280 are now employed in the Ohio Oil and Gas Industry.
- Core oil and gas-related industry employment in Ohio (such as pipeline construction and well drilling) was up 1,319 jobs (17.7 percent).
- \$76,643 was the average wage reported in core related industries. That is \$32,401 greater than the average wage for all industries.
- \$58,908 was the average wage reported in ancillary oil and gas-related industries. That is \$14,666 greater than the average wage for all industries.

The industry is responsible for \$793 million per year in Ohio salaries.

Ohio keeps \$793 million per year in the state when buying locally produced natural gas and crude oil.

Ohio consumers save \$30 million per year in avoided interstate pipeline transportation costs, and another \$9.2 million per year due to the price-reducing impact of local natural gas supplies.

The industry reinvests \$238 million annually on exploration and development.

The industry pays over \$32.7 million annually in local, state and federal taxes.

The industry generates approximately \$988 million in gross state product and a statewide output or sales of \$1.7 billion per year.

The industry paid over \$90 million in royalties and provided another \$61 million in free gas last year to local landowners (mineral interest owners) including farmers, businesses, schools, churches and local governments with wells on their property.
